



HOUSING IN AMERICA


No State Has an Adequate Supply of Affordable Rental Housing for the Lowest Income Renters





Over 1 in 7 Renters Not Caught Up on Rent During Pandemic, With Renters of Color Facing Greatest Hardship

HOMELESSNESS IN AMERICA

An estimated 100,000 Americans living with HIV are experiencing homelessness

These people are at a higher risk for other infections, including TB and HCV, and now, COVID.






AGING AND HOMELESSNESS

- 1/3-1/2 of persons in a shelter are over age of 50 in New York.
- Homelessness is greatest among people over 40.
- As Baby Boomers age, this number is increasing.

About 40 percent of homeless adults reported difficulty with one or more activities of daily living, while a third reported having fallen in the past six months. About a quarter had cognitive impairment, 45 percent had vision impairment and 48 percent had urinary incontinence.



THE INPACT OF HOUSING ON PEWHA










HOPWA OVERVIEW

Approximately **150,000** households receive HOPWA housing assistance and/or supportive services annually.

8 out of 10 HOPWA beneficiaries are extremely low or very low income.

Among new clients receiving direct housing assistance last year, approximately **4,448** (19%) were homeless and living with HIV.

45% of the HOPWA-eligible individuals served under the program are between the ages of 31 and 50, and 41% are over 50.

55% identify as Black or African American, 35% identify as White, and 16% identify as having Hispanic/Latino ethnicity.








