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
EDUCATION

It is with great pleasure that I welcome you to the ANAC2021 annual conference. We are thrilled to be gathering together to share experiences, gain knowledge and new perspectives and have conversations - in person! I thank you for coming and, in doing so, demonstrating that guided by science and evidence, we can get together safely and responsibly in our new reality.

I know the past 20 months have been tough for you, your families and colleagues. The COVID-19 pandemic began with uncertainty and fear that quickly escalated into horror and disbelief as we witnessed serious illness, mounting deaths, misinformation and overwhelming isolation and separations. Many of our sessions explore aspects of this and I couldn't be prouder of the amazing lineup of speakers, sessions and abstracts planned this year.

Our powerful closing plenary will look at HIV care across the generations through a nursing lens. It's a "must-see" session. The other plenaries are powerful too - each one with an inspirational speaker examining intersectional issues around HIV and the important roles of nurses therein. With so much on the agenda, it's even hard for me to choose what to attend! In addition to the outstanding research posters submitted by members, we are featuring posters developed by ANAC staff and committees that share some of the organization's work in the exhibit hall this year. I hope you get a chance to view them.




