

The UCSF School of Nursing is pleased to announce the **Next Generation Nurse Scientists Ending the HIV Epidemic** training program (Next Gen Nursing EHE), funded by the National Institute of Nursing Research (T32 NR020776), and led by Drs. Carol Dawson-Rose, RN, PhD, FAAN and Glenn-Milo Santos, PhD, MPH. Next Gen Nursing EHE supports four predoctoral and two postdoctoral nurse scholars each year (tuition, stipend, travel support).

Scholars receive guidance from a mentor with expertise in their area of interest; participate in quarterly seminar series on HIV content and research methodology; and participate actively in ongoing HIV-related research on campus. Scholars may also work with a mentor to design and implement independent research projects. Scholars benefit from the resources of the UCSF research-intensive academic medical setting, with extensive opportunities for cross-disciplinary collaboration. Mentor areas of expertise include, for example, biomedical, behavioral, social science, qualitative, and quantitative research; implementation science; intersectionality; trauma-informed care; social and structural determinants of health; sexual and gender minorities; substance use; COVID-19; health disparities; preference-based treatment; stigma; drug-assisted psychotherapies; medication adherence; and PrEP.

Shaping the future of HIV care through social determinants of health research

Social determinants of health (SDOH), the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age, along with the wider set of forces and systems that shape the conditions of daily life, play a key role in the health of people living with HIV/AIDS. This presentation will explain why it is important to consider SDOH when conducting research and why nurses are uniquely positioned to conduct this research. This presentation will also share a framework for conducting SDOH research and provide specific examples of ways nurse-led research funded by the National Institute of Nursing Research is improving practice, informing policy and advancing health equity for those living with HIV.



Update on Sexual Transmitted Infections: Advanced and Interesting Cases

Rates of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in the US continue to increase. Each year over 2.5 million STIs are reported, including over 700,000 cases of gonorrhea and 1.6 million cases of chlamydia. While most providers are easily able to recognize typical symptoms of STIs such as genital discharge, asymptomatic and atypical presentations often go undiagnosed with potential for long term complications. Doxycycline postexposure prophylaxis (DoxyPEP) is a new and contentious option to reduce rates of bacterial STIs. The context of STIs will be explored including counselling, relationship structures, and sexual/gender diversity.


